
United States. In the United States the last Sunday in June was initially celebrated as 'Gay Pride Day,' but the actual day was flexible. In major cities across the nation the 'day' soon grew to encompass a monthlong series of events. Today, celebrations include pride parades, picnics, parties, workshops, symposia and concerts, and LGBTQ Pride Month events attract millions of participants around the world. Memorials are held during this month for those members of the community who have been lost to hate crimes or HIV/AIDS. The purpose of the commemorative month is to recognize the impact that lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender individuals have had on history locally, nationally, and internationally." - Library of Congress

Intersectional Pride

Because there is such a wide diversity of people encompassed by the term 'LGBTQIA2-S+', an essential aspect of celebrating and advocating during Pride is acknowledging and embracing its innate intersectionality.

What is Intersectionality?

Race, ethnicity, gender, sexuality, ability, and socioeconomic status are a few of a multitude of identities that shape how we view and interact with the world around us. When these multiple identities overlap, they create unique experiences that vary from person to person.



How does Intersectionality connect to Pride?

To properly celebrating Pride, we must all recognize and appreciate the wide variety of experiences within the LGBTQ+ community, and the ways in which intersectional identity contribute to that variety. Historically, many intersectional voices within the LGBTQ+ community have been excluded from the master narrative. Use this Pride month as a reminder to uplift the stories and experiences of all, especially those that remain untold.



The Progress Pride flag was developed in 2018 by non-binary American artist and designer Daniel Quasar. Based on the iconic rainbow flag from 1978, the redesign celebrates the diversity of the LGBTQ community and calls for a more inclusive society. For Quasar, the light blue, pink and white stripes represent trans and non-binary individuals and the brown and black ones represent marginalised People of Colour (POC) communities.

Juneteenth June 19, 2023

A Brief Timeline:

1980

Texas became the first state to recognize Juneteenth.

2008

Nearly half of states observed the holiday as a ceremonial observance.

2019

47 states and the District of Columbia recognized Juneteenth, leaving only Hawaii, North Dakota, and South Dakota.

2021

President Biden signed a bill making Juneteenth the eleventh American federal holiday.

What is Juneteenth?

June teenth, celebrate annually on
June 19th, is a federal holiday
commemorating the emancipation of
of enslaved people in the United
States. On June 19th, 1865, 2,000 Union
troops arrived in Galveston Bay, Texas,
and announced that the more than 250,000
enslaved Black people in the state, were free
by executive decree. The holiday is also
called "Juneteenth Independence
Day," "Freedom Day" or "Emancipation
Dav."
