# Hispanic Heritage Month

## September 15 – October 15

Every year, Hispanic Heritage Month is a time to celebrate the cultures. histories. and contributions of the American Latino community. ## Emmett Till and Mamie Till-Mobley National Monument

On July 27th, President Biden established the 425th National Park: The Emmet Till and Mamie Till-Mobley National Monument, with site locations in Mississippi and Illinois. The following is adapted from the <u>National Monument Webpage</u>.

In August 1955, Emmett and his cousins drove to Bryant's Grocery and Meat Market to buy snacks after a day spent picking cotton. Eyewitnesses with Emmett said while buying candy, he whistled at the cashier, Mrs. Bryant, and the boys quickly left. The subsequent, vicious response to this perceived breach of racial customs shook the country and sparked a movement for social justice.

When Carolyn's husband Roy Bryant heard of Emmett's apparent interaction with his wife, he and his half-brother

J.W. Milam sought to punish him. In the dark of night on August 28, the two men drove to Emmett's uncle's home, and demanded him at gunpoint. After taking Emmett, the two men beat and shot him, before throwing his body in the Tallahatchie River. Three days later, Emmett's mutilated body was found floating in the river and retrieved near Graball Landing in Glendora. Bryant and Milam had already been arrested for the kidnapping (to which they admitted), and the discovery of the body meant the two men would now be charged with murder.

After learning of the horrific murder of her only child, Mrs. Till-Mobley demanded Emmett's body be returned to Chicago. Her next request turned private grief into the grief of the nation. Knowing the powerful effect it would have, his mother insisted on an open-casket funeral for Emmett. Confronted with the image of Emmett's battered body, the nation could no longer ignore the deadly impacts of hatred and racism. Heartbreak, disbelief, and rage galvanized observers to demand change. However, justice was still far from reach.

Two weeks after the funeral events, eyes were back on Mississippi. The murder trial for Roy Bryant and J.W. Milam took place at the Tallahatchie County Courthouse in Sumner. An all-White, all-male jury was selected. Two local Black men, Moses Wright and Willie Reed, offered groundbreaking testimony by taking the stand against White defendants. Mrs. Till-Mobley also testified. Despite what appeared to be overwhelming evidence of the defendants' guilt, the jury returned a not guilty decision after one hour of deliberation. The verdict caused international outrage. Bryant and Milam later openly confessed their guilt for a magazine story, but double jeopardy prevented them from being retried.

From tragic loss came resistance. Mrs. Till-Mobley and other family members continued to seek justice and fight for equality. Many activists, including Rosa Parks, later identified the Emmett Till injustice as a catalyst for their involvement in the civil rights movement.

  <u>Unsolved Civil Rights Crime Act</u>
  was signed into law. It allows for
  the investigation and
  prosecution in cold cases related
  to civil rights murders that
  occurred before 1979.
- In 2022, Congress passed landmark legislation making lynching a federal crime. It is named "<u>The Emmett Till</u> <u>Antilynching Act.</u>"

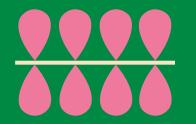

# READ, WATCH, LISTEN

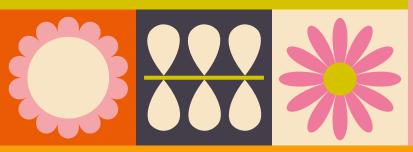

## White Fragility - Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk About Racism

I am a super slow reader, but I found this book really easy to get through! The author of White Fragility is a white, female, antiracist educator, who explains the topic of white fragility using personal stories of leading diversity trainings. She focuses on the responsibility of white people in addressing racism in their personal and professional lives. I really enjoyed the sections where she examines her past mistakes and explains how white people can more gracefully accept their mistakes, apologize properly, and grow as antiracists. I learned a lot!





## WATCH:

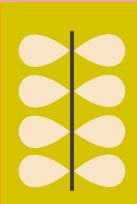
#### **Crip Camp**
